

### <u>Pillar of Prayer</u>

The forty days of Lent are traditionally a time of fasting, repentance, and prayer. Of these spiritual disciplines, prayer is arguably the most important practice we can focus on during this season. Prayer was one of the primary ways Jesus drew close to his Father, especially prior to his crucifixion. As we reflect on Christ's ultimate sacrifice for our sins, strengthening our prayer life allows us to walk in solidarity with him. When we make prayer a daily priority through Lent, it helps us withdraw from worldly distractions and guide our hearts heavenward. Spending dedicated time communicating with God through prayer, confession, thanksgiving and supplication is vital for growing in faith and grace. As one of the pillars of Lent, regular prayer nourishes our soul, deepens our dependence on God, and reminds us of our need for Christ's salvation. This Lent, make prayer a habit that outlasts the season.

### Pillar of Fasting

Fasting is an important spiritual discipline that, along with prayer and repentance, helps define the season of Lent. When we deny ourselves food or other pleasures, it allows us to identify more closely with Jesus' sacrifice in the wilderness and on the cross. Fasting strengthens our ability to resist temptation and influences that draw us away from God. It also helps us focus more intently on nourishing our inner spiritual lives through prayer and Bible study. As we fast during Lent, whether from sweets, social media or luxuries we often take for granted, it reminds us of our dependence on God for all things. Fasting humbles us and awakens gratitude for the blessings we receive daily. This Lenten pillar fosters self-control and deepens our

compassion for those who lack life's basic necessities. May our fasting be joined with prayer and almsgiving for both spiritual growth and to bless others.

### Pillar of Almsgiving

In addition to prayer, fasting and repentance, almsgiving is an important spiritual discipline we practice during Lent. When we give to those in need, whether through financial donations, acts of service, or gifts of kindness, it allows us to participate in Jesus' ministry of mercy, compassion, and sacrificial love. Just as Christ emptied himself to serve humanity, almsgiving calls us to empty our pockets and open our hands to bless others less fortunate. Giving alms fosters gratitude for what we have been given, and humility in recognizing our shared brokenness and need for God's grace. As we deny ourselves certain luxuries through fasting, almsgiving ensures we direct those savings toward those who lack life's basic necessities. This Lenten pillar cultivates generosity, strengthens our concern for the poor and vulnerable, and unites us in brotherly love.

### Your 1 Living in Unity

"Now I appeal to you, brothers and sisters, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that all of you be in agreement and that there be no divisions among you, but that you be united in the same mind and the same purpose". 1 Corinthians 1:10

Division within the church is one of the most serious problems a church can face; if not the most serious. It can devastate the church fellowship, worship, mission, and witness to the world unless it is solved quickly. Paul knew this; therefore, he sought to solve the problem immediately.

This Lenten Season, 2024, the Christian Education Department has decided to explore and apply the principles of unity and liberation to our personal spiritual growth. We don't often look inward when we think of unity or unification. Unity is a gathering; a bringing together of people, ideas, effort and creation. It is not a stand-alone state of being. Conversely, liberation is about breaking free; a release of constraints of wrong behavior or thinking. It is seemingly easier to accomplish solo, than a with a group of differing ideas and focus. And it is for this reason that I believe we should focus on the two concepts in one effort, and the 40 days of Lent is the perfect avenue to adequately study and apply the dual concept of Unity and Liberation.

The Word of God teaches us that it is imperative to cultivate unity in the body of Christ. It is "good and pleasant for us to dwell together in unity" (Psalm 133:1); we are not to forsake "the assembling of ourselves together..." (Hebrews 10:25); "being like-minded, having the same love, being one in spirit and of one mind" (Philippians 2:2). Our heavenly Father not only wants us to spend time together or hang out together doing the same things, He wants us to love the same, pray the same and think the same. That's a lot, and our human selves often fall short. Services fall flat, projects fail, goals may not be reached, or there is constant bickering, butting heads and back-biting, instead of peace and harmony, all because we are not "together in unity." Don't get me wrong, we are working, carrying out our duties, serving the Lord and the church, but are we offering our very best to God?

#### Prayer

Oh God, as we start this Lenten season, please help us to live in unity with one another and liberate us from those things which does so easily beset us. Amen.
